Auctioneering is like amateur radio. You need to do it on a regular basis to be good at it. Most auctioneers only do a few sales a year. There are just not enough art and collectible auctions for one auctioneer to do a sale a week. Automobile and livestock auctioneers get the most chances to do auctions. If you see a "world championship" contest for auctioneers, almost all will be active livestock or automobile auctioneers. If you don't get to auctioneer multiple days a week, or if your radio activity is limited a couple weekly nets, voice training may help keep "mic fright" at bay.

There are many versions of Betty Botter. The original, in my opinion is too difficult. Your brain is very focused on the words and less focused on how to say them. I prefer this version, found on an auction school website. The lyrics are much easier. Hint - it is actually harder to say it slowly.
